Issue Highlights**April is National Poetry Month and Autism Awareness Month**

A young girl, around the age of 7 years old, was taken from her home in Senegal/Gambia, West Africa, and put on a ship set to travel across the Middle Passage to the shores of

Boston. In the month of August, 1761, this young frail girl was purchased as a domestic by the Wheatley family and given her first name, Phillis, after the cargo ship that brought her to Boston. Recognizing the spirit of young Phillis, the Wheatleys decided to allow her how to read and write.

Phillis Wheatley is best known for her poem, "An Elegiac Poem, on the Death of that Celebrated Divine, and Eminent Servant of Jesus Christ, the Reverend and Learned George Whitefield," written in 1770. Poems on Various Subjects, Religious and Moral was circulated in 1773 and was the first published volume of poetry by an African American in modern times. - Starter homes will encourage young families to move in and neighborhood schools can stay open

- City Workers (caregivers, firefighters, police, teachers, retail employees) can live where they work
- Small businesses can thrive
- This will create more walkable and bike-able neighborhoods

Arts, Events & Culture

The ACLU of Northern California started a podcast in February called 'Gold Chains Podcast'. This podcast addresses the misnomer that California came into the Union as a free state as part of the Compromise of 1850. Ironically, in 1850 California passed laws that stripped African Americans of their civil rights. The pilot podcast was titled, "California Fugitive Slave Law". Fugitive slave laws allowed white enslavers to recapture the formerly enslaved who traveled to California, a supposed free state. The California legislature also tried to block African American migration to California five times between 1849 and 1858. The second podcast is called, "Black Testimony Matters", which tells the story of George Gordon, a barber in San Francisco, who, because he was Black, was unable to testify in court, vote, or send his child to public school. From the March edition of the MVLA Magazine, "Ethnic Studies is the interdisciplinary study of race and ethnicity, emphasizing the experiences and contributions of people of color in the United States. As part of the coursework, students will develop a deeper understanding of historical and contemporary movements for social change and ways to challenge racism and discrimination and positively transform their communities." We can all let our local and state representatives know Climate Change is a priority for us with letters and phone calls. We can also reduce our use of single use plastics and plastic bags. - This year, five trillion plastic bags will be used. That's 160,000 every second!
- The amount of single-use plastics used globally has tripled since the start of the pandemic, with takeout orders driving the increase.
- In the U.S., we throw away more than 50 billion coffee cups every year. These are coated with plastic to laminate the inside and use plastic lids.
